The Work of the Town Council

During the last twelve months the Town Council has continued to provide a high standard of events for the people of Normanton and Altofts. All of these events are provided free of charge and give families an opportunity to enjoy activities in their own area. This year we have further developed our events to ensure that they continue to be relevant and attract a family audience.

Events in the last year include:

Commonwealth Day; Party @ Haw Hill Park; Normanton Gala and Gala Sunday, including free funfair for children with special needs, bowls competition and Talk and Slide Show; Horticultural Show; Halloween in Normanton; Christmas Lights Switch On; Children's Christmas Party; Schools Carol Service; Christmas Celebration with Normanton Lions and Churches Together.

In addition to these events, we also held a number of Civic events including Civic Sunday and Remembrance Sunday.

We have continued to work closely with local Schools, and provide them with an opportunity to learn about the Town Council by offering visits to the Town Council Offices. The Schools visits in 2016 were supplemented with a presentation which highlighted the history of the Town Council as well as the services that are provided.

Our Committees have continued to work hard throughout the year in line with their Terms of reference.

We have continued to work with Wakefield MDC to promote Normanton Market to make it an attractive place to shop and have organised several Second-Hand Markets which have been very successful and which will continue for the foreseeable future.

The Town Council has provided support to residents in many ways including assisting with complaints about toilets, dog fouling and litter. We have shared these concerns with the District Council and achieved success in many cases. The Town Council continues to refer residents to the Food Bank which offers food and support to people in crisis.

We were lucky in 2016 to receive visitors from Canada. Former Normanton residents Mr & Mrs Foley travelled to the UK to York to visit family and contacted the Town Council as they wanted to visit and learn more about Normanton since they left in the 1960s. Mr & Mrs Foley were treated to tea and cakes with the Mayor and presented with a small gift bag of Normanton memorabilia to take back to their family in Canada. The Woodhouse Community Centre continues to provide attractive accommodation which has recently been

redecorated. The Meet 'n' Eats Diner which was created in partnership with The Well Project continues to thrive and now serves over 60 people per week and is completely free.

The Town Council organised a 'Sloppy Slipper' event at the Woodhouse Community Centre in partnership with Normanton Home Safety Committee. The event was supported by many local organisations and was well supported by the community who were able to attend and get a new pair of slippers with the aim of reducing slips and trips in the home.

The Town Council has sought to support the views of residents by lodging a further objection to HS2 which proposes to blight our area and surrounding villages. The Town Council is firmly of the opinion that HS2 is not required and the funds should be invested into developing the existing rail Infrastructure.

We have continued to support Community Groups by providing over £5,000 in funding through the Small Grants Scheme and Youth Activity Fund. These grants provide much needed funding to small community groups in our area who do a wonderful job on a voluntary basis. Thanks should also be recorded to Arif Ahmad from the Amadiyya Muslim Association who provided £500 will also be invested locally as part of the Mayors Charity Fund.

During 2016/17 we have been in discussions with Wakefield MDC over the transfer of Normanton Town Hall. We see the Town Hall as an asset for the community and would like to see it protected for the future. We also see the Town Hall as a hub for information which the public should be able to access and make use of.

For that reason, we have chosen to increase the precept for 2017/18 to pay for the improvements required to bring the building up to modern standards. The precept increase may seem a lot in percentage terms but in reality, it is only an increase of £7.64 per year on a band D property which is 15p per week.

We hope that the public will benefit from the building being restored and accessible and are keen to get started on the project.

The Mayor has worked throughout the year to raise the profile of Normanton throughout the District and

beyond. The Mayor has raised over £4,500 for his charity Fund which will support the Yorkshire Air Ambulance and local good causes. My best wishes to Councillor David Appleyard as he takes some well earned rest and to Councillor Steven Hudson who will take over as Mayor and Councillor Denton Jones who will be Deputy Mayor in 2017/18.
